The double bass strumming was a sight and sound extravaganza, matched by Peter's dynamic display on the drums and the tireless and masterful piano playing. Along with the soothing yet stimulating vocals, young and old in the audience, were transported to the good old days and back again as the musicians took us through different moods and times.

After the final flourish and tumultuous applause had died down a magnificent array of prizes were raffled, donated most generously to the DBA by various contributors. The concert raised just over £300 that will be put towards the Summer Event and a donation to St Peter's. 

STALIN IN DE BEAUVOIR



A hundred years ago, De Beauvoir was the scene of a three-week meeting that helped change the face of the world. The location was a chapel, now long gone, in Southgate Road at the corner of Balmes Road, opposite the present Rosemary Gardens. There, 336 delegates of the Russian Social Democratic Labour Party, precursor of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union, held their fifth congress. It lasted from April 30 to May 19, 1907. Those who took part included Stalin, Lenin and Trotsky. The two main factions, the Bolsheviks and Mensheviks, dominated the discussion and the meeting sealed their divisions, the former triumphing. They plotted revolution, which came in 1917 with the overthrow of Tsar Nicholas II.

They could not meet in Russia and the tsarist government had put pressure on other countries including Sweden and Denmark to refuse the meeting a home. The meeting elected Lenin to the presidium, along with Feliks Dzerzhinsky, who went on to found the KGB. Stalin, then little known outside his home country of Georgia, stayed in Tower House, a doss house off Whitechapel Road, making his way daily to De Beauvoir. He never referred to his stay in London.

Here is how the writer Maxim Gorky recalled the chapel: "I can still see vividly before me those bare wooden walls unadorned to the point of absurdity, the lancet windows looking down on a small, narrow hall which might have been a classroom in a poor school."

The building appears on Ordnance Survey maps as a Congregational Chapel and Congregational Church but was in use at the time by the Brotherhood Church, a Quaker offshoot that still survives, running a farm in Yorkshire on organic and ecological principles. The Brotherhood Church was formed in 1891 when John Bruce Wallace, who preached a mixture of Christianity and Marxism, took over the then-derelict church in Southgate Road. He also opened a food co-operative in Downham Road. In 1897, attendees to the 4th International Vegetarian Congress 1897 heard a humanitarian sermon at the chapel.

The building's association with causes continued: the National Film Archive has footage of mounted police ("the forces of loyalty and patriotism") breaking up a pacifist meeting there in 1917 when it was still known as the Brotherhood Chapel.

The chapel ceased to function in the 1930s. The whitelead works opposite (the site of Rosemary Gardens) was destroyed by German bombing in World War Two but it is unclear whether this was also the reason for the disappearance of the chapel.

HANDS ACROSS THE OCEAN - REACHING OUT AFTER 157 YEARS

Wayne Sheffield of Perth, Western Australia has traced his ancestors to the early days of De Beauvoir using the DBA website to contact the present owners of the house where his great-great-grandfather, Charles Sheffield, lived. Charles is shown living with his wife and two sons at 30 De Beauvoir Square in the 1851 census - and may have been the first occupant. He called himself a “Landholder.”

One of Charles’ sons, Adolphus, was born in the house in 1850 and is Wayne’s great-grandfather. Charles died in 1852 and Wayne, though he had a picture of the gravestone, did not know where he was buried. We checked the Abney Park cemetery records and found him there, passing the information to a grateful Wayne. The cemetery has 25 Sheffields listed, so they may have been an important family in Hackney.

Wayne’s grandparents, William and Ada, left England with their five children in 1923 on the RMS Osterley for a new life in Australia. Now, Wayne plans to visit De Beauvoir to see the house where his great-grandfather was born.

BEWARE CLOTHES MOTHS!

A friendly warning from a household invaded by the Common Clothes Moth: these small, silvery moths are on the increase, due to the warmer weather. Rentokil have treated several households in De Beauvoir recently, including ours: it’s expensive, takes three days over a period of a month, and was not totally effective. Moths are VERY destructive, infesting wool, silk, fur, and sometimes originating from bird’s nests in attics. The eggs are hard to see, as the casing is made from whatever they are laid on, and they blend in. The larvae are little white grubs with a brown spot on the head, and the larvae cases are long, silky and white: these are the most visible. See <http://www.the-piedpiper.co.uk/th8a.htm> for more detail.

The best prevention is old-fashioned spring-cleaning, plus zipped jumper bags, and polythene to wrap rolled carpets or other textiles. Remove the food-source, and the moths will go. Mothballs are NOT effective if just placed in a cupboard, and there is now some concern that they are carcinogenic, so I’d advise avoiding them. If infested, take the items into the garden and thoroughly vacuum, examine, remove larvae, lay in the sun. But check around the house: if you have one object infested, there may well be more. To treat an infestation yourself, go to [historyonics.com](http://www.historyonics.com), and you can order a water-based spray designed for use on museum objects i.e. will not damage precious items. Rentokil’s is solvent-based, therefore more noxious, and it stained one of our pale carpets. However, if you have a bad infestation, treating single objects won’t solve it, as the moths hide in skirtings, floorboards, cupboards, and I’m afraid a full commercial fumigation might be unavoidable. Good luck!
