# The Met's Silver Lining

A proposal to turn the vacant Metropolitan Hospital in Kingsland Road into a varied array of craft workshops is being seriously considered by Hackney Council. Self-employed silversmiths, wood-carvers, instrument makers, fashion designers and the like would be able to set up business in the red-brick Victorian building which closed as a hospital in 1976 and was bought by the council earlier this year.

Details of the scheme are being worked out for the council by Mr Michael Murray, himself a silversmith and founder of the craftspeople. He recently helped questions remained unanswered. Hackney Borough carry out a similar conversion on two buildings in Curtain Road.

The future of the Met and the adjoining Nurses! Home has been in limbo since Governmentenforced cuts meant shelving the original plans to provide housing there.

Mr Murray outlined his ideas at a public meeting held in the\_ Ufton Centre at the end of October. He said the proposal allowed for 250 people to use the priority when it came to building, each paying about £20 for a licence. Those requiring for too. The Nurses' Home could Enfield Road and there would be accommodation could be catered be converted into 2-room living units with people paying £16 to £18 a week rent.

The promised attractions of the scheme are many:

- What is now a derelict and dirty building would be cleaned up and the whole site properly landscaped.
- The Council would receive an income from rents and rates for the site instead of paying out vast sums for it to be patrolled Way. by security guards.

The £400,000 conversion cost (£250,000 for the hospital and £150,000 for the Nurses' Home) would not have to be paid by the Council as this, together with the rent and rates, would be met by the rents charged to the craftspeople using the building.

\* The use of the building would be classified as 'light industrial', which should mean no disturbance to the surrounding But among the unanswered questions residents.

In view of these points, many of the 50 people at the meeting were broadly in favour. Some doubts were expressed, some of the fears allayed - but some

However, we were assured that there are plenty of people who would like to rent such a workshop and about a third of the places are already filled, assuming the proposals are adopted.

It is expected that maintenance costs can be met by the estimated £190,000 pa revenue, even if only 80% of the places are let.

Hackney people would be given allocating space.

The main entrance would be in on-site parking for over 50 cars. Very few of these self-employed craftspeople can afford to run a car, so it is not expected that parking in surrounding roads would create any problem. The sort of materials that might be delivered for these types of work are not usually bulky, so there should be no difficulties regarding deliveries by heavy vehicles. Lorries delivering fuel and refuse vehicles would be the only users of the other proposed entrance in St Peter'

Noise should not be a problem as no heavy machinery will be in use on the site. The licences granted to the occupiers would specifically say that noise must be kept down to an acceptable limit. In any event, a noisy occupant would disturb his fellow-workers and the proposed tenants' committee of 12 would soon deal with such a

Clearly, some more thought must go into the proposal before it is finally adopted. Let us hope that if and when the Council and Mr Murray sign together on the dotted line of the 25-year lease, they will be bringing a valuable and trouble-free scheme to De Beauvoir and the people of Hackney.

## NEW TOWN NEW

At the Liaison Meeting of the South-West District Office Committee on Wednesday 18 July 1979, there was a note on the agenda to the effect: Demolition of Laundry. This was discussed, together with the possible demolition of the St Helier sheds. Tenants from St Helier had asked that the sheds be demolished at the same time and that the area be considered for landscaping. Although this was discussed and the Housing Management Committee had agreed to the demolition, nothing came forward until October 1980 when plans were proposed and shown to the 1972 Tenants' Association. These plans were supposed to be going to the GLC and, if approved, the GLC would pay. The work was supposed to be completed by the end of March 1981.

Needless to say, as most people on the De Beauvoir Estate know, that did not happen. Work appeared to start in March. The sheds were demolished and the laundry was knocked down. The rubble was piled up in a heap and... just left. A far cry from the landscaping that had been promised!

The 1972 Tenants' Association asked what was happening and various answers were given. It seemed that, although the plans had been approved and the money had been agreed, Hackney Council had to spend the money first before it could get it from the

It took letters from a tenant to the local MP, Ronald Brown, to get things moving. Mr Brown consulted with the Secretary of the Tenants' Association and the Ward Councillors. Thanks to Mr Brown and the Councillors who met the Leader of the Council and the Chairman of Planning and Highways Committee, the money was finally allocated. This was exactly a year after the approval of the plans! The scheme is now under way and the tip of rubble has been removed. We hope it is completed without further delay.

#### Round the Square

We are lucky in having in De Beauvoir Square one of the most attractive square gardens in Hackney. Just to have some green grass and trees is wonderful in London, but the flowering cherry and late-blooming roses in the Square have given particular pleasure to those living here.

So, it was sad to see the maintenance of the Square fall into neglect this year. Lack of regular mowing and care of the Square meant that by the end of the summer it was overgrown and the flower beds denuded. Litter was everywhere and the area behind the vandalised hut looked like a tip.

At the end of July a meeting was arranged with Mr Elphick, the Council's Parks Superintendant. Mr Elphick was sympathetic and helpful and positive that there would be improvement as more staff were about to be taken on by the Parks Department. A major reason for the damage done in the Square was the fact that it had not been locked at night, ever since one of the park keepers had been intimidated by local youths. It's worth remembering that the park keeper's job is not always easy and can be lonely - local support and appreciation mean a lot. offered to organise a rota amongst those living near the

Planning permission has been granted to redevelop the Dalston Odeon site into a covered market, not a freezer centre as was once proposed.

The now sad-looking cinema at the junction of Stamford and Kingsland Roads is scheduled to be demolished early next year and replaced by a two-storey building, housing stalls and spaces for about 40 small traders, two larger shops and a cafe.

Proposed hours of opening are 9 to 6 Monday, Wednesday and Saturday, and 9 to 8 Thursday and Friday. There are plans for parking for 20 cars with the entrance in Stamford Road and the exit in Tottenham Road.



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
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## A Starlit Knees-up.

From 7 every Tuesday and Friday evening, deep every Tuesday in the heart of the Rose Lipman Library, a strange activity may be witnessed. In an enclosed and, by the end of the session, steamy - room, the training of the De Beauvoir majorettes, now called the Starlights, is proceeding apace.

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
